There was an Odd Fellows Lodge that, on the second story of the school house. No records of this group can now be found.

After the Givil War, the Confederate Veterans were organized and were active. They held regular reunions and many from here attended.

The women joined the United Daughters of the Confederacy and maintained their loyalty to those who fought for the Cause. They kept scrap books and raised money for monuments and maintained records of those who had fought for the Confederacy.

NE GRO THE BLACK FAMILIES

Inman has been blessed with the presence of many fine black families.

To name some of these there are the Forts, the Prayors, the Carltons,

the Hands, the Gays, the Hunnicutts, the Whitakers, the Coggins,

the Grooms, the Tom Westmorelands, the Brooks, and the Joe Porch family.

There are two local lodges: The U & A Lodge, a burial society, bought land from Dr. Welden in 1906. Its purpose was to take care of the sick and help bury the dead. Homer Brooks is president.

Bright Hope Lodge #465, Free Ancient and Accepted Yorkright

Masons was organized in 1974 with Homer Brooks as worshipful master.

Their main purpose is to take care of the sick, help bury the dead, and to help worthy brothers in distress.

OTHER ON THE DARKER SIDE

All has not been love and gentleness in Inman throughout the years. There were two men who lived here who were especially rough characters, particularly when they were drinking. Many of the ladies would cross the street rather than meet up with them. It is said that one of them slashed a man's throat for no cause as he was leaving the grocery store. Fortunately, Dr. Chambers came along and was able to save the man's life.

There have been other incidents when persons were shot and killed in cold blood and the perpetrators were not brought to justice.
